### 2018 PSAT/NMSQT

The PSAT/NMSQT will be administered at West Shore on Wednesday, October 10th. All juniors will take the test at no cost as the West Shore PTA is paying their test fees. All sophomores will also take the test at no cost as the result of a district/state initiative. Any students in grades 7 through 9 may also take the test for a cost of \$20. Spots will go on sale in Guidance starting on Monday, September 17th. Bring \$20 (cash or check made out to West Shore) to the Guidance office to purchase a spot. Brevard Public Schools has been experiencing a decrease in staffing levels for school bus drivers throughout the county. Mid-South Transportation is currently at a critical level shortage. If you are interested, or know of anyone who may be interested, please call. Also, a BPS employee who refers someone hired as a bus driver, is eligible to receive a \$250 bonus.



### FROM THE ATTENDANCE OFFICE

Part of the reason our students have been successful here at West Shore is because we keep class interruption to a minimum. Parents can help by trying to schedule appointments for students at a time when school is not in session. However, we know that is not always possible. In that case, send a note in with the student to the attendance office the morning of the appointment. A pass will be issued to the student for the student to leave class at the designated time. This keeps us from having to call into the classroom and distracting the teacher from doing what they do best, teach our students. Also, if a student is in a PE class the students will most likely be in the gym or out on a playing field and that delays getting the student to the attendance office for check out. ### **DUAL ENROLLMENT STUDENTS**

Dual enrollment students may go to myEFSC to schedule their registration appointment for 2019 spring term classes beginning Saturday, September 29, 2018.

- Students with a registration appointment may register in person with an EFSC advisor beginning Monday, October 29, 2018.
- Walk-in Registration opens on Monday, November 5, 2018. Students may come to campus and be seen on a first come, first served basis or may schedule a registration appointment and be seen at a specific time.
- Please remind students that they must have a completed Dual Enrollment Registration Form with a signature in order to register.









# Medication Rules Florida Statutes 1006.062 and the Brevard County School Board




- 1. A separate Permission form must be completed for EACH medication given at school. Forms MUST be signed by the parent/guardian every year and given to the clinic nurse.
- 2. When completing Permission forms, please make sure that your instructions match the pharmacy label or manufacturer label.
- 3. <u>Clinic staff will not accept a medication if the label has been altered in any way.</u> Please DO NOT write on the pharmacy label.
- 4. All medications must be in the **ORIGINAL CONTAINER** with the manufacturer or pharmacy label in place. The medication must have a valid expiration date **and** the prescription must be current.
- 5. Medication in baggies will NOT be accepted or administered. This includes cough drops and over-the-counter (OTC) medications.
- 6. All medication will be counted upon arrival at school. The parent/guardian will initial to verify that the count is correct.
- 7. FOR YOUR LEGAL PROTECTION, PLEASE DO NOT ALLOW YOUR CHILD TO TRANSPORT ANY MEDICATION TO/FROM SCHOOL.
- 8. OTC medications will remain in the clinic for 10 days, then, discarded. Age-appropriate doses will be given as directed by the manufacturer's label. If a longer time period or a dose change is needed, written physician authorization is required.

THIS MEDICATION POLICY IS TO ENSURE THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF ALL STUDENTS. MEDICATION WILL ONLY BE ADMINISTERED WHEN FOLLOWING PROPER PROCEDURES. CALL THE CLINIC IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS, 321-242-4730 EXTENSION 3007.

**RE:** Bullying Prevention Month

October has been proclaimed by Governor Rick Scott as Bullying Prevention Month in Florida. ### **West Shore Whirly Girls Drone Team**

West Shore Jr./Sr. High School has formed a Drone Innovation Team comprised of eight girls in grades eight through 12 who are interested in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) fields. The team will meet every Monday at 6:45 a.m. and every Thursday during Power Hour lunch throughout the school year.

The purpose of this endeavor is to create an extracurricular opportunity in which these students will learn about basic aeronautical principles and drone design innovation. The content will challenge these students in mathematics and physics properties such as body design, speed, and aeronautical principles. They will be using a 3D printer to create different versions of the drones. The drones will be designed so that the students can control their maneuverability and speed. By researching what has previously been done, as well as trial and error, the students will determine optimal drone body designs. They will also evaluate both the speed and maneuverability of the drone. Students will then determine how to innovate the drone design and print their own parts using a 3D printer to improve the drone's performance.

In addition to the challenges associated with learning new software and how to fly the drones, the students will have many opportunities to troubleshoot problems they encounter on the team. The intent of this endeavor is that these Whirly Girls will share their knowledge and experience with future drone teams, thus creating a larger and self-sustainable program in the next several years.

Dr. Mark Mullins, Superintendent of Brevard Public Schools, and Ms. Tina Descovich, Brevard School Board Vice Chairman, recently made a visit to the West Shore media center to see the Whirly Girls Team in action. Superintendent Mullins joined in on the fun using the First Person View Goggles to visualize the drone flight. Michael Gruener from Aether Vision explained to the group that the pilot who is controlling the drone on the ground can use the goggles to see what the quadcopter is seeing which in turn makes it easier to avoid obstacles than flying line of sight.

#### To donate blood:


- You must be at least 16 years of age (requires parental consent)

# New Gradebook Access Coming Soon!

We are excited to announce that beginning on October 15th, all teachers will begin using a new gradebook called FOCUS School Software. FOCUS School Software will offer a new updated user experience for parents and students including a downloadable app.

We will begin the school year using the current Edline system for grading, and parents will access grades just as they do now.

Beginning on October 15th, the Edline button at the top of the district site and your school's homepage will be converted to a FOCUS button.

Your school will be sending out more information about creating and accessing your new FOCUS parent account in the middle of September. Parent access will be available on October 15th.



### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT GOVERNMENT IS CONDUCTING A VOTER REGISTRATION

HS SGA is conducting a voter registration drive during the following days: October 3, 4, and 5, in the computer lab – room 3-102, during power hour. For the first time in recent history, people of our generation outnumber the elder population in terms of percentage of the populace. This presents us with tremendous collective power, if we only choose to use it, through voting.

If you want to see things change, if you want to make your voice heard, meet SGA members in the computer lab, 3-102, on October 3rd, 4th, and 5th, during power hour. We will show you where you can register to vote online.

- If you are 18 you can register and vote in the next eligible election
- If you are 16-17, you can pre-register and you voter registration card will be mailed to you when you turn 18.
- You will need a valid Florida Driver's License # or Florida Identification Card # to register (which you will enter while registering online)
- If you are 18 currently and want to register and vote in the upcoming election on November 6, your deadline to register is Tuesday, October 9. (29 days prior to the election)
- Florida is a closed primary election state. In primary elections, registered voters can only vote for their registered party's candidates in a partisan race on the ballot. In a primary election, all registered voters, regardless of party affiliation, can vote on any issue, nonpartisan race, and race where a candidate faces no opposition in the General Election. If you do not indicate your party affiliation, you will be registered with no party affiliation.



Please communicate this information to all building occupants and their legal guardians.

Our records indicate that no asbestos removal activities or any other type of asbestos response actions have taken place at West Shore Jr./Sr. High School during the past year (July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018).

### Background Information

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires all accredited school districts to provide building occupants with a yearly correspondence describing any/all asbestos materials removed from each school during the past year.

The EPA Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) of 1986 required an asbestos inspection of each school facility nationwide. This inspection was completed in 1988. The scope of the survey included sampling building materials that might contain asbestos, assessing the condition of the materials, performing laboratory analysis of each sample, and writing a comprehensive report called an Asbestos Management Plan.

The Management Plan document and subsequent Three-year Reinspection documents are on file at the school Administration office. These documents are available to the public for review.



### Head Lice Prevention and Control Head to




Head lice are spread most commonly by direct headto-head (hair-to-hair) contact. However, much less frequently they are spread by sharing clothing or belongings onto which lice have crawled or nits attached to shed hairs may have fallen. The risk of getting intested by a louse that has fallen onto a carpet or furniture is very small. Head lice survive less than 1–2 days if they fall off a person and cannot feed; nits cannot hatch and usually die within a week if they are not kept at the same temperature as that found close to the scalo.

# The following are steps that can be taken to help prevent and control the spread of head lice:



Avoid head-tohead (hair-to-hair) contact during play and other activities at home, school, and elsewhere (sports activities, playground, slumber parties, camp).

Do not share
combs, brushes,
or towels. Disinfest
combs and brushes used by
an infested person by soaking them in hot water (at
least 130°F) for 5-10 minutes.





Do not lie on beds, couches, pillows, carpets, or stuffed animals that have recently been in contact with an infested person,

Machine wash and dry clothing, bed linens, and other items that an infested person wore or used during the 2 days before treatment using the hot water (130°F) laundry cycle and the high heat drying cycle. Clothing and items that are not washable can be dry-cleaned OR sealed in a plastic beg and stored for 2 weeks.





Vacuum the floor and furniture, particularly where the infested person sat or lay. However, spending much time and money on housecleaning activities is not necessary to avoid reinfestation by lice or nits that may have fallen off the head or crawled onto furniture or clothing.

Do not share clothing such as hats, scarves, coats, sports uniforms, hair ribbons, or barrettes.



Do not use furnigant sprays or fogs; they are not necessary to control head lice and can be toxic if inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

# BREVARD PUBLIC SCHOOLS 5517.01 POLICY AGAINST BULLYING AND HARASSMENT

In response to changes made to Florida Statute 1006.147, that became effective July 1, 2013, Brevard Public Schools has updated School Board Policy 5517.01 that prohibits bullying, harassment, teen dating violence, and abuse. The policy ensures that all students, employees, and volunteers learn and work in an environment that is safe, secure, and free from harassment and bullying of any kind.

Florida Statute 1006.147 defines bullying to include cyberbullying and means systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees and may involve but is not limited to chronic teasing, social exclusion, threat, intimidation, stalking, including cyber-stalking, physical violence, theft, sexual, religious, or racial harassment, public humiliation, and destruction of property.

Cyberbullying means bullying through the use of technology or any electronic communication, which includes, but is not limited to, any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or in part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic system, photo-electronic system, or photo-optical system, including, but not limited to, electronic mail, internet communications, instant messages, or facsimile communications. Cyberbullying includes the creation of a webpage or weblog in which the creator assumes the identity of another person, or the knowing impersonation of another person as the author of posted content or messages, if the creation or impersonation creates any of the conditions enumerated in the definition of bullying. Cyberbullying also includes the distribution by electronic means of a communication to more than one person or the posting of material on an electronic medium that may be accessed by one or more persons, if the distribution or posting creates any of the conditions enumerated in the definition of bullying.

Harassment is defined as any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gesture, use of data or computer software, or written, verbal or physical conduct directed against a student or employee that: places a student or employee in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person or damage to his or her property, has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities, benefits or has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of a school.

Bullying and harassment also encompasses retaliation against a student or school employee by another student or school employee for asserting or alleging an act of bullying or harassment. Reporting an act of bullying or harassment that is not made in good faith is considered retaliation. Perpetuation of conduct is listed in the definition of bullying or harassment as causing an individual or group with intent to demean, dehumanize, embarrass, or cause emotional or physical harm to a student or school employee by incitement or coercion, accessing or knowingly and willingly causing or providing access to data or computer software through a

computer, computer system, or computer network within the scope of the district school system and/or acting in a manner that has an effect substantially similar to the effect of bullying or harassment.

Cyber-stalking, as defined in Florida Statute 784.048(1)(d), means to engage in a course of conduct to communicate, or to cause to be communicated, words, images, or language by or through the use of electronic mail or electronic communication, directed at a specific person, causing substantial emotional distress to that person and serving no legitimate purpose.

Florida Statute 1006.148(1)(a) prohibits dating violence and abuse by any student on school property, during a school-sponsored activity, or during school-sponsored transportation.

West Shore Jr./Sr. High School is committed to providing a safe learning environment and will not tolerate bullying or harassment of any kind. Incidents of bullying or harassment can be reported to the principal or any administrator. Anonymous reports can also be made by calling the Speak-Out Hotline at 1.800.423.8477.
